My good friend Senator Landis, who is over there puffing away in a very studious fashion, should have it brought to his attention that an editorial was written in one of his...the leading papers of his city pointing out how the present law in the books is not being enforced when improper activity does occur in these elections, and how the County Attorney, whose job it is to enforce the law does not want to get involved.
