except the race for reelection for their boss, or the race on behalf of the challenger of their boss to replace the boss. Now, finally Senator Newell mentioned the Supreme Court opinion, Buckley versus Vallehill which upheld the constitutionality of the Federal Elections Act about four years ago. Now the Buckley case held that it's unconstitutional for a legislative body to place restrictions on what an individual can contribute to his own campaign, but it said it was clearly constitutional if there is a legitimate legislative need to place restrictions on the contributions people can make to the races of other persons. This provision is constitutional. It's a matter of public policy that's wise and I would urge all of my colleagues to adopt it. Thank you for your attention.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Fitzgerald, for what purpose do you...okay. All those in favor of...

SENATOR FITZGERALD: Mr. Speaker, to correct a statement that Senator Hoagland made about Civil Service employees, we are not restricted any more after working hours. You cannot work in a uniform.
