two amendments, one to allow refund or credit when a person doesn't use the cabin trailer for the whole year. These vehicles are different than other motor vehicles as far as the law is concerned. If an owner of this vehicle buys a new license in January, and then trades the vehicle off, or sells it, he no longer can...he cannot get a refund on his fee. This would allow a refund, or a credit, on the new license plate for a new vehicle. Are there any questions to this first amendment? Shall we take these separately, Mr. Speaker? Mr. Speaker, shall we take them separately? There are two amendments...one to allow a fee refund as far as the license plate, and the other one is to get a refund on the tax paid on this vehicle. I think we should take them separately, don't you? This seems to be an oversight as far as the Motor Vehicle Department. Bill Edwards said there are no problems to change the law. It's something that has been on the books for a long time, and nobody ever noticed this discrepancy in the law. This was brought to my attention by somebody in my district that traded vehicles and he wasn't able to get a credit on his license fee, or on his tax that he paid on his vehicle.
