Select File for a specific amendment. Is that right, Senator Simon?

SENATOR SIMON: Yes.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Now, Senator Goodrich, do you want to explain the amendment?

SENATOR GOODRICH: Mr. President, first before I do that, can I ask you a specific question, that is, can we bring the bill back for a specific amendment and then Senator Simon and I have been working on the form of the amendment. I have got it in one form and he over the lunch hour, rather, has developed an amendment to my amendment which is agreeable to me but we should have it blended in so we could bring the bill back for this specific amendment, then tomorrow we will actually adopt the amendment and shoot it forward again. Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Can you get the amendment to us yet this afternoon?

SENATOR GOODRICH: Neil and I have just been talking, what we will do is we will take up the amendment that you have, my amendment. We will adopt it. Go ahead and advance it again. Then we will bring it back tomorrow to adopt the other amendment but we don't have it in typed form yet.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Mr. Clerk, do you have his amendment?

SENATOR GOODRICH: You still have it, haven't you? Page, give me a Page.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator Goodrich to explain the specific amendment to LB 505.

SENATOR GOODRICH: Okay, what we found in LB 505, and you all will recall when Senator Simon was pushing LB 505 across, advancing it, rather, I suggested that I would be in a position to read it and see if there was any problems with it. If not, fine. If there was a problem, we would have to correct it on Select File. Well, that is where we are now. So what we did, we found a problem with the amendments as they were drafted in that the reports would have to be made by local law enforcement agencies to the division, and in this particular case, division means Child Protective Services, but they would be made immediately which meant that not only does the hot line that is being installed here or implemented have to have twenty-four hours, seven day a
