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forth and there is a great similarity between the disabled and the kinds of prejudice and discrimination that the disabled have and kinds of awarenesses and the kinds of discussions and so forth that would come up around that table and around that discussion and some plans and some legislative proposals and...

SENATOR NICHOL PRESIDING

SENATOR NICHOL: One minute.

SENATOR NEWELL: ...we could avoid this tremendous duplication. We don't need to have the blind to have a separate commission. We don't need to have, you know, those with limb difficulties, having a special commission. If we bring all these together under a commission on the physically disabled, it may cost us a few dollars more but we can prevent this broadening and rapidly expanding areas of commissions. Is your opinion still...and I think it is much different than Senator Haberman's situation and we are talking about doing something as a little preventive medicine as opposed to striking down something...

SENATOR NICHOL: Time is expired.

SENATOR NEWELL: ...Will you consider this proposal, Senator Labeledz?

SENATOR LABEDZ: No, I am sorry, Senator Newell. I will not. I have all ready talked to the Blind Rehab....

SENATOR NICHOL: Excuse me, the time has expired.

SENATOR LABEDZ: ...people and the Aid to the Deaf persons in Omaha and in the State of Nebraska and they say it would not work. The blind people have their needs. The deaf people, their main problem is communication and interpreting services. Their services are entirely different from the blind and from the handicapped. I would prefer to see each one have their own commission. If we want to knock out some commission, let's pick on others but not the blind, the deaf or the handicapped. They all three have their separate needs.

SENATOR NEWELL: Are you telling me that there will be three different commissions coming in?

SENATOR NICHOL: Excuse me, your time has expired. Senator Simon. Before we go further Senator DeCamp has requested
