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separate commission and they are going to ask for this and they are going to ask for that and the groups are going to grow because there is going to be the blind and there is going to be the mentally retarded and there is going to be, you know, and you carry this on to the proserterous, you know the ugly and the fat might want to come over here and say, yes, we have to have a commission because we have problems and I am not so unfeeling as to say that we ought to just do away with these people and not let them have such a commission but what I am saying, Senator Schmit and Senator Labeledz and Senator Chambers, is that there is a problem and that problem is that we cannot do everything and in the process of not doing everything, I think we can, in fact, provide those people with great similarities because they have disabilities, because they are discriminated against, because they do have similar problems dealing with the hearing and the seeing and the feeling world. I say that we ought to combine these commissions and we ought to do that from the very inception. To answer Senator Chambers' point, Senator Chambers, I am not proposing that this bill should be broadened at this time. I think it should be broadened in the future but I think by changing the name at this point, by changing the name now we make it clear where these new commissions would go, what sort of financial situation they would have, what their relationship to other handicapped or disabled individuals might be and for that reason we are setting ahead of time, we are setting up a framework under which we can expand these new commissions that will, in fact, be brought before the floor. Senator Labeledz, it is much different than what you talked about in terms of doing away or combining commissions that are already created. What my proposal here says is this, is that we will set a framework so we can avoid the duplication. I think it is politically difficult if not impossible to go back and undo the mistakes that this Legislature has made and I have said that on numerous occasions about numerous different other legislation, but what I am trying to say here is that we ought to prevent making the mistake while we have the opportunity because if we set up this commission and if we don't allow for broad number of people to come under this same type of proposal, we are just going to duplicate and duplicate and duplicate and duplicate. We already have a Governor's Committee on the Status of the Handicapped. We have a department that responds to all these people in the same way. We have divisions and so forth. We have probably the most disorganized government than most states

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
