on these amendments, I am representing what I feel is my responsibility, and if it is being 1 out of 49, that is what my responsibility is and my obligation is to speak as that 1 out of 49. I do feel this is a very important matter, and while we are talking about replacement money, I can't get Senator Schmit on this because he voted for the abolition of the tax on food, but the Legislature passed 518 and there was no replacement money and I am still getting letters from county people now saying that the money has not been replaced, yet where is all the hubbub and concern about replace this money before we take this tax off, and that is business and farm inventory. But again it depends on who is to be the beneficiary. We hasten in dealing with millions as long as the right people are involved and quibble over pennies. It is easy for somebody who can speak to win an argument over a person who is dumb because the dumb person cannot speak at all. So we have a similar situation here where the strong are dealing with the weak. The poor are not properly and adequately represented. If I would use one of the tactics, as Senator Kahle mentioned this earlier, Robin Hood, that people feel driven to, perhaps that would be the thing to do to make a point, to forcefully redistribute the wealth and let there be examples of various activities to express in a system which does not allow any other expression the unfairness of the way things are done. I have even heard of threats against nuclear power plants by American grown people because they are that distressed about the way the government is doing things. So when the government consistently shows the backside or lack of consideration and responsiveness to those who need the help the most while at the same time placating those who have everything like the large oil corporations, this whole thing is viewed by the poor people as an entirety and that is the way the Legislature has to view it. This particular proposition that we are dealing with interlocks with everything else that the people of this state must face. So if you are going to do what Senator Wesely is talking about, and I am surprised at what he is doing too but we live and learn, he is instructing me and I accept the instruction, we have got to make sure that the proposition comes close to accomplishing what the introducer intends.
