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the heat. The point is, the point is, did you ever shovel coal into your gas tank? Did you ever put corncobs in your diesel? Did you ever put cornstalks in your airplane? You see, you are taking energy that we have in the United States, the corncobs that are thrown away, the cornstalks that are thrown away and you are putting them into a form that is useable, the same way we do with electricity. We take coal, we take oil, we take these things and we make them into a form we can use that can go right into your house in a little wire. So indeed it does consume energy but it is energy we have, energy we aren't using and energy we could be using. Now, the question has been raised as to whether this is just a device, it was hinted at, the whole gasohol program, to increase farm prices? Believe it or not, that is the least purpose. That is the last purpose. It is to utilize our resources. What am I talking about here? At the present time, at the present time, corn takes up a lot of room. Bushel basket, you have to store it. We have got bins all over the country storing it. What is the purpose of that corn? In most cases when we ship grain to foreign countries, it is to get protein. Protein is what they need, and now we are back to the thing that Senator Dworak raised and criticized. He said something to the effect that grain maybe should be used for food, not for fuel. The production of gasohol is the one method to utilize grain more effectively for food and for fuel.

PRESIDENT: One minute, Senator.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Now what happens when you produce gasohol? You end up with all your protein in a concentrated form so instead of shipping a ship full of corn, you can now put it in a plastic package and ship concentrated protein. You don't have to have grain storage bins all over Hades. The additional by-products you can use for cattle feed. The potential is unlimited. Now, he said I only had one minute. Can I borrow three of those minutes that Senator Stoney was going to give me because I have got a couple more points that he raised. The constitutionality, a very legitimate question. We have had this form reviewed by Kutak, Rock, Hule, whatever their name is. They have reviewed it in depth, made corrections and we feel the form it is in now is a constitutional method for accomplishing this. Free enterprise, there is nobody tried harder to get free enterprise to build these gasohol plants than Johnny D and Loran. Our bill to put the half million that Senator Hefner brought up, we tried. We are against a deadline, and energy deadline, and unless we get moving now, it is not going to happen. The big program at the federal level to build the
