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and the form it has taken, we are all not complete sure of because you have got to mesh the committee amendments with the other proposed amendments and once we get a copy with them all put together we can kind of sit down and look it over. I have talked to Senator Wesely and Senator Schmit and Senator Hoagland and they realize maybe there is some room for give and take and a little rearranging of things but I think the best way to do this now that everybody has kind of got the lay of the land here and seen that maybe one side wasn't as strong as they thought and the other side maybe was a little stronger than they thought, even if some of the votes are a little soft, maybe both sides could sit down with their key people and find out where the give and take is and you might just be surprised. You might be able to resolve transfer, big issue. You might be able to resolve doctors, the other major issue. I think if you sit down and talk it over, move the bill on to Select, I know Sam doesn't want to do that, but move her on. If you are going to stage a final fight to kill it or whatever, do that only after you have exhausted all your other remedies or possibilities of trying to see where you can agree. So I urge you to move the bill on. This isn't the time to give the life and death struggle on the thing and sit down with the people on the outside that have an interest in it, and input, people on the inside here that have some input, and I think you are going to find you can work out something. I know both sides know where the areas of disagreement are and there is some middle ground on them. So I encourage you not to spend just too much more time worrying about killing it because everybody knows you have got to pass something.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Koch, then Senator Chambers and then Senator Wesely. Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: Mr. Speaker, members of the body, I rise to support Senator Cullan. I have been listening intently this afternoon and I refuse to get involved in either side. The consensus amendments obviously had the support but I still believe that if you look at the amendments there are some of them that we could have adopted in a negotiated fashion that would have been to the benefit of all of us but I remind you that the costs of health care are not unique to this state, and if you are looking for the culprit, I would remind you it is probably the federal government. Hill-Burton funds, what do they do? They build hospitals. Politicians sent back to Nebraska huge sums of money to build the Midland Hospital in Sarpy County when primarily they can't use it. By the same token you have a private system, the Methodist Hospital, who wants to move Children's Memorial Hospital out there to
