SPEAKER MARVEL PRESIDING

SPEAKER MARVEL: Have you all recorded your presence?
Do you want to record?

CLERK: Quorum present, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Do you have anything to read into the...?

CLERK: No, sir, I do not.

SPEAKER MARVEL: In the North balcony we have as guests today from Senator Carsten's district, thirty five sixth grade students from Syracuse School in Syracuse, Nebraska, Mrs. Marvin Schacht is the teacher, in the North balcony. Would you raise your hands and show us where you are? The first order of business this afternoon is item #6, LB 226.

CLERK: (Read title to LB 226.) The bill was read on January 11 of this year. It was referred to the Education Committee for public hearing. The bill was advanced to General File. There are committee amendments pending by Senator Koch's Education Committee, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator Koch.

SENATOR KOCH: Mr. Speaker and members of the body, LB 226 introduced by Senator Lamb is a bill that is intended to diminish the total effect of LB 889 which we passed last session which deals with the early intervention education of severely handicapped children. Senator Lamb's proposal advanced to the floor by a considerable majority of the committee is that the public schools would be responsible for age three to five and at this time I would ask that the body would adopt the committee amendments and then allow Senator Lamb to proceed with his part of this proposed legislation. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the adoption of the committee amendments to LB 226. All those in favor vote aye, opposed no. We are voting on the committee amendments to LB 226. Have you all voted? Record.

CLERK: 25 ayes, 0 nays on adoption of committee amendments, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion carries. The amendment is adopted. Senator Lamb.
