

basically it is some mechanical things, it says that any person who has contributed more than \$100 in any one month to the principle or the lobbying purposes. On the whole, the bill is one that we can see the lobbying provisions doesn't weaken it so much as it does clarify it and I'll take some of the Mickey Mouse reporting requirements out. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the adoption of the committee amendments. Senator Hoagland.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Hoagland moves to amend the committee amendments by striking paragraphs 6, 7, and 8.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Mr. Speaker and colleagues, I'm moving to amend the committee amendments to reinstate two provisions in the original bill which are found on pages 7, 8 and going on to 9. What these two provisions do essentially is a... very simply they require that the lobbyists maintain a record of all of the underlying receipts. All of the underlying paper work that is behind the forms that they have to file with the commission. So that the commission can more easily exercise its audit functions, if they have to go in and audit something all of the underlying papers are there. It is the same kind of requirement that we have in maintaining our campaign finance records. Now the other thing that it does, it reinstates the paragraphs on pages 7 and 8 of the original bill starting on the middle of page 7 and on the top of page 8 and it requires just a little bit more enumeration of lobby expenditures on various things spent for public officials. I think that these are both, they are not major additions they are relatively minor they will strengthen the bill a little bit, they were part of the original bill as introduced and I would ask for your support for this amendment. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the adoption of the Hoagland motion to the...the Hoagland amendment to the committee amendment. Senator Cullan, your light is on.
