SPEAKER MARVEL: The bill is declared passed. Now before we go to the next bill, in the south balcony it's my pleasure to introduce from Senator George's district thirty-four 4th Grade students, two teachers, seven parents from the Oakland-Craig School at Oakland, Nebraska. The teacher is Dorothy Wallace. Will you raise your hands so we can see where you are and welcome you to the Legislature? Coming into the north balcony at the moment from Senator Brennan's district is a second group from St. Cecilia Junior High in Omaha, thirty-four 8th Grade students, two teachers, and Sister Marie Joan Okeefe is the Math teacher. SPEAKER MARVEL: Read the motion.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator Venditte.

SENATOR VENDITTE: Well, Mr. President, I will be very brief with this particular amendment. I think the amendment is rather self-explanatory, but I would like to inform my colleagues of the problems that we've been having in South Omaha, in the City of Omaha, with the existing bale fill operation. As you may or may not know, the Legislature last year passed LB 182 which set guidelines for the operation of such a site, and in this bill or in this legislation that was passed by you, this Legislature, it said that any bale fill operation shall not have odor. It said that a bale fill site in operation shall not have noise and dust. A bale fill site in operation shall have a fence constructed. A bale fill site that is operating shall not have the problem of rodents. Ladies and gentlemen of the Legislature, the bale fill operation in the City of Omaha is in blatant violation of state law right now. There is no question about that. City officials have come back within the last several days and have said that the bale fill operation complies with state law, but yet if you were to

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
