and I think if anybody ought to be exempted these people at least ought to be exempted. That is why I chose this category as opposed to the other amendments. I think this is legitimate. It is right. Senator Kelly, it takes away the arguments that others have used in 1969 and 1972. For that reason I hope we adopt this amendment. I think it will add to your bill, add strength to your bill, at least it will be honest, fair and just which it seems not to be a criteria and for the rest of you and Senator Cullan who chooses to cease debate before anyone has an opportunity to speak, I regret that there will be more amendments only because the unfairness of this whole action today. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: The question is then the adoption of the Newell amendment to LB 221. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? ...about seven. How many are absent? Five, all right, five. Senator Newell, there are five absent so what do you wish to do?

SENATOR NEWELL: Let's have a Call of the House.

PRESIDENT: All right, a Call of the House has been requested. All those in favor...motion, Call of the House, vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 11 ayes, 17 nays.

PRESIDENT: Senator Newell.

SENATOR NEWELL: Could I have a record vote on the main motion? Make it a record.

PRESIDENT: All right, you can have a record vote on the main motion, all right.

CLERK: (Read record vote as found on page 1650 of the Legislative Journal.) 8 ayes, 18 nays, 23 not voting, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Motion fails. Next motion on the desk, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Koch moves to indefinitely postpone LB 221.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Koch. Would all of you turn off your lights and put them on again. Many
