SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, and Senator Nichol, even though you're the Chairman and I think you're very objective when you presented the Committee report and made the motion to advance, I can't vote to advance the bill.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the advancement of the bill. Is that your motion, Senator Nichol? All those in favor of advancing 374 to E & R for Review vote aye, opposed no. Have you all voted? Anybody else wish to vote?

SENATOR NICHOL: Mr. Chairman, there seems to be plenty of people present to vote on the bill, so it doesn't matter to me.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Clerk, record the vote.

CLERK: 13 ayes, 10 nays on the motion to advance, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion fails. The bill does not advance. The next bill...we skip 436, constitutional amendment. We go to...Senator Johnson, are you ready for 35 and 35A?

SENATOR JOHNSON: Yes, sir.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 35 was introduced by Senator Johnson of the 8th. It's a bill for an act relating to welfare. (Read LB 35 by title.) The bill was read for the first time on January 4. It was referred to the Public Health and Welfare Committee for hearing. The Public Health and Welfare Committee has Committee amendments pending, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Cullan.

SENATOR CULLAN: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, the general intent of the Committee amendments were to lower the fiscal impact of LB 35 and still achieve the goals set out by Senator Johnson in establishing a standard of need. The Committee amended the bill to provide that the standard of need process and figures would be
