SENATOR CULLAN: Okay, Senator Johnson, and I have to say Senator Johnson has been willing to accept virtually every amendment that we have proposed. I think he's trying to make this a workable piece of legislation, but I do have an amendment coming up that would say that it is for informational purposes only and I would subscribe to that amendment because I think right now we're buying something sight unseen and we really don't know what the effect of that is going to be. So Senator Johnson I'm going to oppose this particular amendment and hope that mine is adopted.

SENATOR JOHNSON: I appreciate that.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Haberman, your light's on.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. President, I have some questions of Senator Johnson, please.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Yes, Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Senator Johnson, whenever I receive amendments like this on the floor they kind of scare me a little bit, and I was looking through your amendment and may I ask you a couple of questions, please?

SENATOR JOHNSON: Yes, sir.

SENATOR HABERMAN: You have in here on Page 3, shelter which is safe, healthful, fit, habitable and provides reasonable space and privacy to its occupants.

SENATOR JOHNSON: Yes, sir.

SENATOR HABERMAN: You have here items incidental to household operation, education, personal needs and transportation. Do I understand that these things are not stated as this under the present law or rules?

SENATOR JOHNSON: What the....yes, you're probably correct.

SENATOR HABERMAN: They are, or are not?

SENATOR JOHNSON: They're probably not stated in that fashion under the present rule, Senator Haberman.
