give it to anyone. I have never read in the bill where it says the physician has to give it to anyone.

SENATOR JOHNSON: That is right.

SENATOR CLARK: Now if you think a physician is just going around arbitrarily giving this out, you had better get rid of physicians. They are not going to do that. This is strictly permissive.

SENATOR JOHNSON: I understand that. This bill doesn't mandate that a physician prescribe laetrile but the bill does mandate that when a physician does prescribe laetrile that the hospital or the nursing home or the health care facility in which the individual is a patient has got to administer that drug.

SENATOR CLARK: That is right if it is prescribed.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Clark, you have forty-five seconds left.

SENATOR CLARK: That is plenty of time. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Now there are several of you who keep your lights on so the Chair is not certain whether you are interested in the discussion. We are dealing, and I would remind you it is now five after eleven and the debate should cease at eleven-forty, we are speaking to the Wesely amendments. Is there anybody else who wishes to speak to the Wesely amendments? Senator Venditte.

SENATOR VENDITTE: Yes, Mr. President, and members of the Legislature, I think of the series of amendments that have been introduced to us in dispatch this morning, I would say that there are maybe one or two of the Wesely amendments that I would support and others I would reject. I am having a little problem understanding why Senator Wesely has just come this morning with these amendments. I think the consequences, the far-reaching consequences, that some of these amendments may have certainly would be detrimental to the freedom of choice of a cancer patient. I would recommend two things, number one, a division of the question, and secondly to Senator Wesely, at least, hold these amendments until the bill advances to E & R Initial this morning and then give us an opportune...this would give us opportune time to perhaps discuss this matter with physicians and even legal staff and I think we then could come back on Select File and discuss these particular amendments more
