intelligently. I know just in the first two or three rows here this morning we are asking each other questions about the various amendments that have come up this morning. I don't think it is fair on such a controversial issue as this has been that we get these kinds of amendments all of a sudden without any real time to be able to analyze just exactly what these amendments might do. So if Senator Wesely is not in agreement to withdraw the amendments and perhaps inject them on Select File so that we could debate these amendments more intelligently, then perhaps maybe we could have a division of the question. But I think in all fairness, Senator Wesely, you would want to do....Senator Wesely, may I ask you a direct question?

SENATOR WESELY: Certainly.

SENATOR VENDITTE: Would you be willing to withdraw the amendments and hold them until Select File?

SENATOR WESELY: No, I can't support this bill without these amendments and without your amendments to the bill.

SENATOR VENDITTE: Well, I think being frank, members of the Legislature, Senator Wesely wants to kill the bill and I think with one or two of those amendments that he has in there, he will get that done just the way he has always wanted to do. I would caution you to support the Wesely amendments. If he is not going to divide the question, the amendments, then I would suspect that we would have to at least oppose the Wesely amendments and, Senator, I don't think it is fair that you come with these kinds of amendments here this morning with only a half an hour left or forty minutes and expect us to be able to rationally vote on these particular amendments and I think it is highly unfair.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Labeledz.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Mr. Speaker, I first want to say that I agree wholeheartedly what Senator Clark said a short time ago and I am thinking about a small town that has one hospital that may refuse to administer laetrile and the person there or being sent there by his doctor with a prescription, and keep in mind that he has already been told of all the conventional methods and has signed the consent form, and he goes to the hospital and there and then he is told that they will not administer laetrile. I think this is wrong and we are going to object to Senator Wesely's portion of his amendments where he is eliminating
