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that much from the state's share as you understand how that is distributed by a strange complicated formula. You go through personal property tax relief when we take \$70,000,000 of taxpayer's money and send it back in terms of relief and we send it back on the basis of where that county is. I voted for 518, probably shouldn't, but that is a bad distribution of money from my perspective. But if you look at it in total what we have done, we have done a pretty fair job of putting money where services are needed. Some counties get a little more money in mental health. Some counties get a little more money than a per capita basis in personal property tax. Some counties get a lot more money in terms of highway tax money and I think you have to do that on the basis of where the need is and where the numbers are. Each of us could go through this process right now and pick out a way to get more money back from our district in each of the funds. I think it is a mistake to start the tampering with the formula. I think it is a mistake to address it simply in this simplistic way because it is certainly a lot more involved than that. I put my amendment up there certainly not with any seriousness of purpose at this time but trying to explain that it is easy to come down here and pick out one little item and say, listen, I think I can get more for Farnam if I introduce this piece of legislation and I can take it away from someone. I know I can do that on the gas tax money. I know I can do that on a half a dozen other projects. It is not good sense to do it that way. Mr. President, I ask unanimous consent to withdraw my amendment and I ask that we reject the bill as presented by Senator Vickers.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Warner, do you have an amendment you want to speak to?

SENATOR WARNER: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, the amendment I have on the desk is one which I have indicated to some residents of my legislative district I would offer. I offered it also at public hearings on the various state aid bills and offer it on this one or any subsequent one and all it does is puts a formula in for the method of determining nonresident tuition for those schools of course that are not in a high school district. The basis for the formula is 120% times the actual cost calculated by the same identical formula which has been on the books for a good many years in which the tuition for seventh and eighth graders are computed. There has been some concern expressed that using this formula for nine through twelfth grade was not equitable but on the other hand in all the years I have
