CLERK: 27 ayes, 0 nays to cease debate, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is carried. Debate ceases. Senator Murphy, you may close on your amendment.

SENATOR MURPHY: I would only say in response to Senator Koch's qualifications, that no such qualifications are set forth in this statute. Let's don't start cluttering this with some of the pet projects someone somewhere has that do not truly qualify under the issue that was put to the vote of the people in this state.
