of opinion as far as the administration and programs as it goes to the requests of the unions, trade unions, and others, but I would remind Senator Brennan that much of the money that supports that institution does indeed come from property tax and we do limit this. I know that Senator Brennan has in hand because I gave him a copy of the bank deposits of Metro Tech but I would advise him that a considerable amount of that money is invested because there is a lawsuit pending now over faculty salaries. Salaries have not been increased for Metro Tech employees for over two years. So that money has necessarily been placed on deposit fully expecting that possibly those employees are going to receive an increase for these past two years and possibly for this third year we are now in. In addition to this, when you criticize Metro Tech, you must remember it is a very heterogeneous community. It is not what you would call too homogeneous. There are different interests, the private sector, the public sector, the labor sector, you name it. All of them have been involved in this growing stage to try to get programs they feel that are right or not right and I submit to Senator Brennan and to others, we might as well be candid, that the trade unions have requested certain kinds of programs at the industrial training center and it is under the full blessing. There are some other programs that Metro Tech carries for the Associated Building Contractors, such as, minimal courses in plumbing, electrical procedures, things of that nature, and they are generally not under the auspices of the trade unions. So naturally this causes some problems. I do not believe we would ask the schools, the public schools of the State of Nebraska, to come into the Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and advise them how they are spending the money that the state gives them, that great sum of \$55 million, because that would be an exercise in futility. I do not believe we should place the community colleges under the same kind of jurisdiction either because they get about \$16 million of state aid. At the same token they raise the biggest share of their budget out of tuition fees and the local property taxes. So, therefore, for us to try to run some kind of a fiscal audit of those dollars I think would be extremely tedious because we are not subsidizing them like we do the University and the colleges of the State of Nebraska, where basically we have a large sum of money involved. So I cannot support Senator Brennan's amendment.
