SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator George, for what purpose do you rise?

Obviously Senator DeCamp didn't like the previous vote and he is reopening the auction floor. At least I would like to know what he is auctioning off. So far, I think, Mr. President, if that amendment is not printed in the Journal, we are expected to have that on our desk and I don't know what the DeCamp amendment is about and I would like to know and I would like to see it in written form.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator George, I have this suggestion, that technically we have constantly proposed amendments that were not in the Journal or on your desk. Since this matter is very serious matter and one that all legislators should at least have the opportunity to take a look at, this is what I would like to do. Well, first of all, let me ask this question? How many more amendments are there on the budget bills? Senator Landis, you have an amendment. Who else has an amendment? Senator DeCamp has an amendment. Senator Landis. Are there any other amendments, Mr. Clerk, on the desk?

CLERK: One other, Senator.

SPEAKER MARVEL: And whose?

CLERK: It is offered by Senator DeCamp.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator DeCamp has two amendments?

CLERK: Yes, sir.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, I would propose that we do this, that we recess, that we return at 1:30 p.m., and that in the meantime, will those that have amendments please see that at least a copy is on the Clerk's desk so we can have them reproduced and have on your desk so that when you return at 1:30 p.m. you have got something in front of you.
