SENATOR NICHOL: Okay, that's all I wanted to know. Thank you.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Just before it was out.

SENATOR NICHOL: But now it's still out.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Subsequent, you know, it's out.

PRESIDENT: It's in unless you vote for this motion. That's the way I understand it.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Yes.

PRESIDENT: Is that right, Senator DeCamp?

SENATOR DeCAMP: Yes.

SENATOR NICHOL: If you vote for this amendment, it's out.

SENATOR DeCAMP: That's right, and if you want to do a chiller, do her separate.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President, My nimble-footed friend, Senator DeCamp, has confused everybody again. I think the most chilling effect we'll ever have on the University is what we did this morning, and if we really want a chilling effect to continue then you vote against the DeCamp amendment. I think that it's most apparent to all of us here today that the game plan is still going on. I want to say again that insofar as I am concerned, I really am not that much at, ill at ease about the construction budget with this one exception, that there comes a time when everything needs to be paid for, and I am continually reminded of those things that need to be paid for when I mention some minuscule amount of money that is invested in perhaps even such a thing as salaries. You know, I think that first of all you hire good people and you pay them well and you work them hard, but if you want to concentrate upon the construction of physical facilities, you're going to further encumber this state with obligations that are going to continue to come due year after year. Now the University said they needed a chiller, they contracted for it against our advice perhaps, without our knowledge, but that was the number one priority.
