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of the world if for one year we adopt a moratorium on construction. The eloquent speech made this morning by my neighbor, Senator Dworak, does not convince me that there is a clamor or even a cry for any of those projects which have been described. We've talked about pork barrel on this body and that's what it is....

PRESIDENT: One minute, Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT:plain and simple, and I guess you have to decide if that's the direction you want to go. I don't think there's anything wrong with sticking by our guns at the point we're at right now. Now you can flip-flop back and forth if you want to, and you can justify anything you do if you want to, but I think we made our decision this morning and it was a hard one. I think we should stick with it. We should vote to reject and reject resoundingly the DeCamp amendment because you're going to open up the whole charade again with the various proposals that Senator DeCamp has outlined to you if you vote for it. I ask you to vote red on the DeCamp amendment.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Murphy.

SENATOR MURPHY: A question of Senator Nichol, if I may.

PRESIDENT: Senator Nichol, will you respond?

SENATOR MURPHY: Senator Nichol...

PRESIDENT: Senator Nichol.

SENATOR MURPHY:if your dance card is not full, may I have the next dance when we waltz this thing around again tomorrow afternoon?

SENATOR NICHOL: If you'll promise me people won't think we're going steady.

SENATOR MURPHY: Okay. Mr. President, if I may, I would call for a division of the question. The DeCamp amendment has two substantive parts and I would like to take the chiller separately.

PRESIDENT: Well, we're....right now I would think that would be out of order at this point. There's no way of dividing it now at this point, because we should have done
