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like amount. That's a \$20,000,000 impact, and I guess as long as you know that why that's the issues you should know. I would oppose the amendment.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator George.

SENATOR GEORGE: Thank you, Mr. President. Now, I believe the Education Committee has been looking around for a long time, desperately looking for \$10,000,000, and believe me I certainly would vote for an increase in state aid just to relieve that property tax burden that we have outstate. Senator Koch has been looking around for it. The Appropriations Committee has been looking for it. It's Chairman, Senator Warner has been looking for it. Suddenly Senator DeCamp...of course, again I don't have this amendment on my desk, but I assume he wants to increase state aid to education by pretty close to \$10,000,000, but suddenly Senator DeCamp finds those \$10,000,000. It would certainly interest me to debate this for a little while because if I can be convinced that \$10,000,000 is lying around somewhere here, I would certainly vote for it, but I haven't seen it yet, so maybe Senator DeCamp in closing with his amendment might be able to explain to us where by some sort of miracle he found those extra \$10,000,000, and I'll be happy to vote for it if he tells me where they are. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Dworak.

SENATOR DWORAK: Well, Mr. President and colleagues, there's certainly nothing wrong with adding the \$10,000,000 if we can find some place where we're going to cut \$10,000,000. It boils down to that. We're trying to live within a seven percent budget. That's what we have intended to do. That's what we have committed to do, and now everything else has been a matter of trading, a matter of you can have this but you can't have that, but the thing is you can't have them both, and now we're starting out again to spend \$10,000,000 more above the seven percent and it's just not in the cards. The money isn't in the bank. I think that as needed, and I've got a district that will probably gain from this. This will probably help my district as much as anything there is, but the fact of the matter is if we're going to set budget limitations and budget restraints for local subdivisions of government like we did in 285, we should be as willing ourselves to live within those restraints. All these programs, all these projects are tempting. They're all
