

them, and that's what the Committee attempted to do. Now here we come in with this fragmentation that's been attempted on this bill for about the third or fourth time now, and it's getting a little tiresome. If Senator Reutzel wants to vote against the bill, fine, do it. If you want to vote against it, fine, but I suggest to you to stick to the figures that we have there. Now if you want to increase it more yet then go to these proposed amendments of Senator DeCamp. I still don't believe they're Senator Reutzel's, and have a look at this. I sent you a sheet around with my name on it showing to the left some penciled in figures. Those figures are what the judges were getting at the end of 1978. In other words, four or five months ago this was the amount they were receiving. Look from there to the extreme left of your page to the extreme right of your page you see what the raise is in a two-year period. I just can't hardly see how that's seven percent. If it is, well I'm as bad as the board up there in my figuring I guess, but I don't see it. I think the judges, and now the Supreme Court judges I understand have not been honking about this, but it's the district judges, the juvenile judges, the metro-county judges, maybe the municipal judges. I don't think the Workmen's Comp Court has been, but I really urge you not to go with this recommended suggestion and change by Senator Reutzel and Senator DeCamp. Thank you.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, I'd like to yield two minutes of my time to Senator Reutzel. Indeed, he has worked with me on these amendments and he had a legitimate reason. He was the chief opposition to the amendments last time, and as you know, I said, all I'm trying to do in the amendments I'm proposing is give a six percent annual increase. Senator Reutzel felt it was more than that. Since that time we've been able to check it out. Indeed it was right, but he had some concerns and those concerns that there was too big an increase in some certain judges. So he said, okay, I'm willing to work with you on this as long as we can make some major cuts in these others and get these things on an even keel, and that's what he offered, and we sat down and worked it out, and that's what we came up with. Now, they reduce the outstate county judges salaries a little over one thousand. That's what he's doing, but they won't become effective until 1981, so that means no fiscal impact this year. Okay, some other questions that were raised...the Workmen's Comp Court has increased approximately two thousand over my last
