SENATOR NEWELL: Let me just replace it with mine and then Johnnie can speak for it.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion before the House is on the DeCamp amendment to the bill. Senator DeCamp, the Chair recognizes you.

SENATOR DeCAMP: I have already talked on it. We discussed it the other day. I think this is a heck of a stalemate and maybe this way something could come out of it for somebody.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Labeledz.

SENATOR LABEDZ: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. I would like to ask Senator DeCamp one question.

SPEAKER MARVE: Senator DeCamp, do you yield?

SENATOR LABEDZ: Senator Cullan mentioned in his speech that he was willing to withdraw the kill motion if I would accept your amendment and then he has five other amendments on the bill.

SENATOR DeCAMP: It is my understanding.....

SENATOR LABEDZ: I am willing to go ahead and let you go with yours.

SENATOR DeCAMP: It is my understanding, Bernice, that he, Senator Cullan, will withdraw his, and he can correct me at any point I am wrong, he will withdraw his if this is adopted but it is my understanding also that Senator Cullan and I are not on the same wave length in terms of the ultimate goal. Senator Cullan would, it is my understanding, like to stop the legislation no matter what. So is that essentially correct, Sam?

SENATOR CULLAN: If Senator DeCamp's amendment is withdrawn, obviously the amendments I have would not be apropos to the bill and I would be in no other position than to withdraw them. I would still very much oppose passage of the bill.

SENATOR DeCAMP: So he is going to continue his fight no matter what. What I am saying is I think this makes a more reasonable bill and something you can work with and it gives you, at least, a fair opportunity. You have got to make your own judgment on that part.
