CLERK: Mr. President, there are E & R amendments to LB 120.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Wesely.

SENATOR WESELY: Mr. Speaker, I move the E & R amendments to LB 120.

SPEAKER MARVEL: All in favor of that motion say aye, opposed no. The motion carried. The E & R amendments are adopted.

CLERK: Mr. President, the first amendment is offered by Senator Schmit.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Mr. President, I ask unanimous consent to withdraw the amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Request to withdraw the amendment. Hearing no objections, so ordered. Next item.

SENATOR KOCH: Mr. Speaker, a question, who is the introducer of this infamous piece of legislation? Is the introducer present?

SENATOR KOCH: Does that include Playboy and such things as that?

SENATOR DeCAMP: Playboy would be exempt, yes.
