CLERK: Mr. President, Senator DeCamp moves that we adjourn until May 14 at nine o'clock.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Before we vote on that motion, if it is successful, I would like to meet temporarily with whichever committee chairmen are here before you get away from me. It's not debatable. The motion is to adjourn until when?

CLERK: Nine o'clock, Monday.

SPEAKER MARVEL: It is adjourn. Okay, adjourn means nine o'clock. The motion is to adjourn. A machine vote is requested? This issue is not debatable, Senator Simon. For what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR SIMON: Just to have a point of information on when we are adjourning to?

SPEAKER MARVEL: When the motion is to adjourn, it is to adjourn until nine o'clock, Monday morning.

SENATOR SIMON: Irrespective of the fact on the green sheet you had nine-thirty?

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Legislature will be at ease for a few moments. Okay, there was an amendment up here and the rules do not indicate that a motion to adjourn is amendable. So the motion before the House is that the Legislature adjourn until nine o'clock, Monday, May 14th.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President, I ask unanimous consent to withdraw that motion. I would like to then submit a question to the Chair on a point of order.

SPEAKER MARVEL: You ask unanimous consent to withdraw the motion?

SENATOR DeCAMP: At least until I get a ruling from the Chair on a point of order.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, hearing no objection, the request to withdraw is in order. So ordered.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Okay, Mr. President, the point of order has to do with this subject and this issue. When bills are put on by E & R after they have already had their machine vote or whatever and they end up back here strictly for the
