CLERK: 16 ayes, 21 nays on the motion to return, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Motion lost. Do you have any other motions?

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Haberman moves to return LB 596 for a specific amendment. That amendment being to strike the enacting clause.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The Chair recognizes Senator Haberman.

SENATOR HABERMAN: I have solved my problem and wish unanimous consent to withdraw the amendment.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Hearing no objections so ordered.

CLERK: I have nothing further on the bill. Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: We now move back to Final Reading and the first bill will be LB 14E. So, will all legislators please take their seats and prepare for Final Reading. The first bill is Legislative Bill 596. Clerk will read on Final Reading LB 596.

ASSISTANT CLERK: Read LB 596.

SPEAKER MARVEL: All provisions of law having been complied with the question is, shall the bill pass with the emergency clause attached? All those in favor vote aye, those opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Clerk will record the vote.

CLERK: 48 ayes, no nays, 1 excused and not voting. Vote appears on page 2108 of the Legislative Journal.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The bill is declared passed with the emergency clause attached. Before we have the next bill, LB, 14 in the south balcony from Senator Kahle's district it is my pleasure to introduce 22 eighth grade students from Axtell, Nebraska. Craig Jacobsen is their teacher. Could you raise your hands so we could see where you are, so we could say hello to you. I would further indicate to you that we are on Final Reading. The Constitution indicates that each bill has to be read word for word finally before the Legislature votes on it. That is what we are doing at the moment.
