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being was really marked as compared to any other session. I don't think the time differential next year because it is a short session is going to be that serious. We are still going to get out in time to do the spring farmwork for those people who are involved in agriculture. It isn't going to take us next year going four days a week as long as it took us this year in the long session going five days a week. So that is really not an effective argument in the short session. This rule change applies only to the short session. We hear the economics of the issue and this will be brought up by the other side and I saved this for last because as far as I am concerned these are the minor points. The fact that farmers want to get out early in the spring, and it is a legitimate reason, it is a reason to consider. That is no problem under this rule change because they will still be able to get out in the spring. But, also those people who have non-farm backgrounds, and there are a lot of us, and there are going to be more, then it also gives them an opportunity if they so chose to spend maybe that one day a week in their own business pursuits. I've heard the argument in private discussion that oh my heavens, this is an election year. Well I relate to my own election two years ago and come the end of that short session I had not put in one minute or one hour of campaign time. I was so wrapped up in the session at five days a week that I absolutely put the campaign way back on the back burner. Now, I don't think that campaigning is a bad thing. I think that forces us out to the people and I see that as a disadvantage rather than an advantage that I didn't have the opportunity to go out and talk with the people. But with four days a week giving us another day whether that be Monday or Friday and that would be up to the discretion of the Speaker, actually it could be another day in the week. All we are saying is that we shall meet only four days a week. That will nothing but assist us in going out and campaigning and meeting the people.

SPEAKER MARVEL: You have got one minute.

SENATOR DWORAK: So with all of these reasons I would like to try it. This isn't craven in stone. If we don't like it, if it isn't working we can change it. It isn't that innovative. The fact that it is in the short session isn't going to make that much difference as far as the spring farmwork is concerned. I'd like to give it a try. I would just like to see if all of these reasons that I stated that I have spelled out are in fact so. We can do it with very little risk. I think that we have a lot to gain. I'm personally willing to take what little risk there is in the hopes of gaining a better, more functional legislature.
