

SENATOR DeCAMP: Okay, in order to by-pass the rest of the afternoon on sending back to committee, would it make any sense to withdraw that and get on to the rest of the bill to see whether she lives or dies and go that way and let her ride on its merits.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Mr. Chairman, I will accept your advice Senator DeCamp and I'll withdraw my motion on returning it to the committee and ask that my motion to kill LB...indefinitely postpone LB 35.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Okay, then the bill will just go ahead and we will take it up in order I suppose...I don't know when that will come up but it just seems to me that would save time. Is it okay to talk on the bill now? Did I use up my time. I think he wants to withdraw his...

SPEAKER MARVEL: Well the Chair indicates Senator Haberman, by withdrawing you need to know where you are so I have been checking with the Clerk there are two motions ahead of your kill motion. One is Senator Johnson's motion and one is Senator Warner's motion. Then would come the kill motion so there are two motions ahead of that. You can't substitute one for the other.

SENATOR HABERMAN: The kill motion doesn't take precedence over the other two?

SENATOR DeCAMP: No, but it wouldn't any way. You are going to get to it no matter what.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Okay, Mr. Chairman, do I still have the opportunity to close on the motion to return it to the committee
