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but I don't think it is legitimate for the Legislature to be using Supreme Court districts for political gerrymandering purposes and this way by putting two justices from each of the three Supreme Court districts why we know where the justices are going to come from. Now the committee amendments are designed so that the tenure of no existing judges will be affected in any way so that problem is taken care of, too.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Haberman and then Senator Keyes and then Senator Murphy and then Senator Johnson.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Senator Hoagland, would you yield for a question please?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Yes, I will.

SENATOR HABERMAN: Does this give Omaha another judge? Yes or no, please.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: No, not necessarily. Right now.....

SENATOR HABERMAN: Wait a minute, not necessarily. It says that the judges stay in office now in spite of reducing the districts from six to three, is that right?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: That is right. It is not going to change the tenure of any existing judge.

SENATOR HABERMAN: So it could be a great possibility that Omaha would get another judge. Just yes or no.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Do you want me to explain how the current system works, Senator Haberman?

SENATOR HABERMAN: No, I know how the current system....

SENATOR HOAGLAND: There is not a yes or no answer to that because I am not going to be choosing the next judge of the Supreme Court so I can't tell you whether he is going to be from Omaha or not.

SENATOR HABERMAN: You are not willing to say that it will or will not give Omaha an extra judge.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: I can't answer that question, Senator Haberman. It is going to mean that the two judges will be chosen from the five counties that constitute that Congressional district if that area doesn't lose a county when the new
