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people at least are being asked to vote on one aspect of the judgeships that quite possibly the concept of one person one vote would attain, and if the concept of one person one vote would attain, then probably it would be incorrect to assume that geographic representation is adequate. We would probably still need to have basic population equity. Otherwise we haven't fully satisfied the one person one vote concept of the United States Supreme Court. Now Senator Hoagland's measure does do this and it essentially allows for an equitable distribution throughout the state of the six associate justices of the Nebraska Supreme Court and I do support his measure.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Nichol and then Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR NICHOL: Senator Hoagland, would you please go through again why it is necessary to reoutline these districts? Why do we need new districts as opposed to the districts we have? Just very briefly. Since Senator Hoagland isn't here, maybe I will ask him another question. He can't answer that one either if he isn't here. Senator Hoagland, why is it necessary that we draw the outside periphery of these districts again? Why isn't the ones that we have, why are they no good?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: You all are being given a second copy now of this letter that was distributed two days ago to your offices so you can read in detail the proposal. The problem with the current situation, Senator Nichol, is that every ten years, under the present provision of the Constitution, it says the Legislature shall redistrict the state after each federal census and the problem is that every ten years we have to redraw those lines.

SENATOR NICHOL: Okay, let's stop there. What is the matter with that?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: It throws into the political arena the drawing of Supreme Court district judicial boundaries.

SENATOR NICHOL: Then are you saying that if we once establish these three districts now, they will never change?

SENATOR HOAGLAND: They will change with the Congressional districts so there are two judges from each Congressional district.

SENATOR NICHOL: So they are going to change either way, aren't they?

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
