

you take the references out to the President in this resolution and want to express concern and want to meet with the President or his representatives to talk about it, I think that is one thing, but to blatantly criticize the President on this floor as foreign policy makers, I find that both naive and repugnant. I ask for the adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT: The question before the House is the adoption of the Lewis amendment on LR 183. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 34 ayes, 0 nays on adoption of the amendment, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: Motion carries, the amendment is adopted. The next amendment on the desk, Mr. Clerk.

CLERK: Mr. President, the next amendment is offered by Senator Hoagland.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes...go ahead and read the amendment and then I will...

CLERK: Senator Hoagland moves to strike paragraph 2 of the resolution on the grain embargo. Senator, may I inquire, are you referring to the "Whereas" portion of the...okay, the "Resolved" part, thank you.

PRESIDENT: Paragraph 2 of the Resolved. The Chair recognizes Senator Hoagland.

SENATOR HOAGLAND: Mr. President and colleagues, I have an amendment up that would strike the paragraph in this particular resolution. It will call on the President to, I presume, go back on television and say we made a mistake in imposing the grain embargo and discontinue the grain embargo. Now I think that would be a terrible mistake to do that at this time. And without getting into the issue of whether imposition of the grain embargo was correct in the first instance, I think it would be a serious mistake in foreign policy for the President to now cancel the grain embargo or for this Legislature to call on the President to cancel that embargo. Now let me explain why. I don't think that the United States or the world has seen aggression of this magnitude since the Soviet Union rolled into Czechoslovakia in 1968, or invaded Hungary in '56, or since the Nazi forces overran Austria and Poland in '39 triggering World War II. Now a lot of people speculate that the Second World War was
