

hurting our farmers, but I think we can take care of that in other ways, and I think it is a mistake for us to back down at this point, and I can't help but recall the words of Jack Kennedy and I wonder where we have come since he said in his inaugural address in the face of threatened actions of this sort, let every nation know, President Kennedy said, whether it wishes us well or ill that we shall pay any price, bear any burden, meet any hardship, support any friend, oppose any foe in order to assure their survival and success of liberty to protect freedom around the world. Now it is clear that we are in a time of grave international crisis, and it is equally clear that foreign policy has to be bipartisan, and that the American people have to speak with one voice. Unless the Soviet people have any questions about our intention, I think that we should make it clear that we support the administration in imposing the embargo even though it is difficult on this part of the country, and that we should urge the President to adopt other means to deal with this crisis, and adopt other means to be sure that the American farmer doesn't have to shoulder the burden himself entirely. I agree a hundred percent with virtually all of the remarks of Senator Schmit. I think they are well stated and I think his statistics and his facts are absolutely accurate, but I hope that we will strike paragraph 2 and instead have the resolution state, let's look for other means to take care of the farmer in this serious situation. Thank you, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Hefner. The Chair recognizes Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: Well, Mr. Speaker, I am going to support what my good friend Senator Hoagland has just said. Under no circumstances should anybody in the United States ask the President to retract the statement that he made when the nations of the free world, get this, the nations of the free world are backing the President of the United States in the embargo on grain to Russia. And the second thing I am going to bring you this morning is, I don't where Senator Schmit comes up that the farmers in Nebraska have lost \$600,000,000. I have not sold any of the grain that is in my granary and my brother has not and my cousin has not. Anybody that I know has not sold and until the grain leaves my hands, I haven't lost the money on it. The grain market this morning opened, the newest contracts, March corn opened six cents higher. Wheat opened up eight cents higher. Beans are up a nickel. I don't know what the market has done since I called, but this is the way it opened on the newest...the latest contracts. So my friends, to say to the President of the United States that he should humiliate himself when all the
