I think that in each and every way we should show that we are displeased with what they are doing and this is one way of doing it. I would like to ask your support on this resolution, a amendment will be offered to the resolution and I tell you now that I will support this amendment, I'm telling you ahead of time so we won't spend to much time on this. I do ask for your support on my resolution. Thank you very much.

PRESIDENT: A amendment on the desk, Mr. Clerk. Read the amendment.

CLERK: Mr. President, Senator Barrett moves to amend LR 184 in line 2, (read Barrett amendment).

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator Barrett.

SENATOR BARRETT: Mr. President and colleagues. It occurs to me simply that these seven words might very definitely be in violation with the Federal as well as the State Constitution. It also appears to me that the State of Nebraska can not confiscate property of a foreign nation by the passage of this simple resolution. I would urge the adoption of the amendment.

PRESIDENT: Any discussion on the Barrett amendment? I have three lights. Do any of you have your lights on...Senator Nichol, Rumery or Kahle, do you wish to speak to the amendment? Not to the amendment? Senato Kahle, do you wish to speak to the amendment? Senator Kahle.

SENATOR KAHLE: Mr. Speaker and members. It is a little hard to separate what I want to say from the amendment so we will start out and see how far we get. I just checked with Mr. Bill Swanson from the University to find out what the status is on our testing of these Russian tractors. The information that I have is that the test is complete. The tractors were tested and have been tested by our University. There are none in the process at the moment. None are contemplated at the moment. These tests were ordered and paid for by an American company who wish to sell these tractors in America. The Regents
