PRESIDENT: All right, we will proceed then to agenda item #8, special order by the Speaker on LB 184. Oh, all right, the Speaker has changed his order temporarily to pass over that because there are some...some of the introducers are not here, in fact. All right, do you want to pass over 486? All right, Senator Reutzel. We will now go on to agenda item #9, General File. Pass over LB 486 and take up then LB 327.

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 327 was introduced by the Agriculture and Environment Committee.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Lamb, would you handle this? The Chairman of the Ag Committee is not with us this morning. Would you handle LB 327?

SENATOR LAMB: What is the bill about?

CLERK: I will read the title, Senator. It is LB 327 introduced by the Ag Committee. (Read title.) The bill was read on January 16 of last year. It was referred to the Ag Committee for public hearing. The bill was advanced to General File. Committee amendments were adopted by the body on March 30 of last year. I have a series of amendments, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The committee amendments have been adopted. All right, Senator Lamb, if you will...if you have had time to look at it, if you will explain what the bill is all about, and then we will take up the amendments on the desk.

SENATOR LAMB: Mr. President, briefly the bill has to do with the controversy in regard to the size of acreages that can be zoned. It is a ten-acre...I think the restriction now is ten acres in order to be subdivided, and this bill will change it to five acres under the committee amendment. That is the smallest parcel that can be subdivided in this case. Why don't you go to the amendment?

PRESIDENT: All right, we will go to the amendments then. Read the first amendment.

CLERK: Mr. President, the first amendment I have is by Senator Warner and Senator Wesely. It was printed in the Legislative
