SPEAKER MARVEL: I will go over the list of absentees once again. There is only one excused. Senator Keyes, Senator Schmit, Senator Kahle, Senator Haberman, Senator Simon, Senator Kelly.

CLERK: Senator Carsten voting no.

SPEAKER MARVEL: We are voting on the advancement of 186 to E & R for Review. All legislators are to be in their seats. The motion is the advancement of 186 to E & R for Review.

CLERK: Senator Simon voting no. Senator Vickers voting aye. Senator Venditte voting no. Senator Haberman voting aye. Senator George voting aye. Senator Hoagland voting aye.

SPEAKER MARVEL: I am sorry but the Legislature cannot violate its rules. Will you please return to your seats? There will be no lobbying on the floor. The Clerk will record the vote.

CLERK: 24 ayes, 15 nays.

SPEAKER MARVEL: What was the vote?

CLERK: 24 ayes, 15 nays, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Okay, the motion fails. We will proceed with the General File, LB 166. Do you wish to pass over this bill? Senator Lewis, do you have amendments you want to bring up?

CLERK: Mr. President, LB 166 was introduced by the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee and signed by the members thereof. (Read title to LB 166.) The bill was first read on January 10. It was referred to the Miscellaneous Subjects Committee for public hearing. There are committee amendments pending by Senator Newell's Miscellaneous Subjects Committee.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Who is going to take the committee amendments, Senator Newell?

SENATOR NEWELL: Mr. President, this prohibits employers from requiring a truth and deception test as a condition of employment or continued employment, and there are a number of exemptions. The exemptions are for law enforcement agencies,
