

in the juvenile court or in the adult court, depending upon his age, and he is subject to fines and in some cases imprisonment for that, but very very few people have any idea that a car can be impounded. So it really doesn't serve any positive deterrent value. All it does is create extraordinary hardship for families when they are caught in this situation unsuspecting. Now, secondly, punishment, that is the other principle for putting provisions in the criminal law. Now the minor who is caught violating the law is not being punished by this. His family is being punished, his parents, his siblings and there is really no point in it. We don't have this kind of provision in virtually any other areas of the law. There is really no point in having it in this area, and there are sufficient other deterrent provisions to take care of the problem, like fines and like sentences and so forth. So I would urge all of my colleagues to vote in favor of this amendment proposed by Senators DeCamp, Johnson and myself to strike this inequitable provision from the law.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion is the adoption of the DeCamp-Hoagland-Johnson amendment. All those in favor vote aye, opposed vote no. Have you all voted? Have you all voted? Senator Johnson. A Call of the House has been requested. All those in favor of placing the House under Call vote aye, opposed no. Record.

CLERK: 12 ayes, 4 nays to go under Call, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The House is under Call. All legislators please take your seats. Unauthorized personnel leave the floor. Record your presence. Senator Murphy, Senator Landis, Senator Keyes, Senator Fowler, Senator Schmit, Senator Merz, Senator DeCamp, Senator Wagner, Senator Vickers, Senator Labeledz. Senator Johnson, all are accounted for except Senator Labeledz.

SENATOR JOHNSON: I would ask for a roll call vote, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Roll call...shall we proceed with a roll call? Okay, call the roll.

CLERK: (Read roll call vote as found on pages 454 and 455 of the Legislative Journal.) 18 ayes, 20 nays, Mr. President.

SPEAKER MARVEL: The motion lost. Any other motions?

CLERK: I have nothing further on the bill, Mr. President.
