It is special legislation. It is special interest taxing, and quite frankly, I don't care how they amend this bill, unless you strike the enacting clause, I cannot live with it. PRESIDENT: Will the Clerk or somebody get a copy of this to Senator Murphy before he votes on it?

SENATOR DE CAMP: Make a copy for everyone, sure.

PRESIDENT: All right, everyone should have...well we should have a copy anyway. There should have been a copy provided. Mr. Clerk.

SENATOR DE CAMP: Well, they are making copies and while they are doing that I will chat with you.
