

that kind of business. We haven't put the money in to attracting that kind of business. Now it may well be that we want to encourage that business for our state. As long as it is out there maybe we ought to try to get it.

SPEAKER MARVEL: You have thirty seconds.

SENATOR JOHNSON: And for that reason this regime may be a good regime. I am beginning to conclude that maybe the bill isn't as bad a bill as I originally thought it was and could even be supportable so I think to some extent Senator DeCamp's Phoenix is gathering some form from the ashes of this juncture, the wings are unfurling and we will soon see if it flies.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Keyes and then Senator Cullan.

SENATOR KEYES: Mr. Speaker and, Senator Marvel, I am going to talk to you. Senator DeCamp, I would like to ask you a question. Senator DeCamp, the money that is going to be collected by this tax now on the motels and hotels goes to the...2% of it goes to the county. Is that right?

SENATOR DE CAMP: If, the county would, in fact, determine by a vote to go ahead and do this then that would go in that local county, that local area for promotion of things there with strict limitations, no capital expenditures or things like that, the local portion, the 2%. You are right, Senator Keyes.

SENATOR KEYES: Now that will not be a part of their 7% lid. Will it? I mean, I am asking you, Senator DeCamp. Is that going to be part of their budget?

SENATOR DE CAMP: I know you are asking me and I am...

SENATOR KEYES: And a part of their 7% or is this another way of getting beyond the ability of the local subdivisions of government to tax under the 7%, a way of getting on beyond that?

SENATOR DE CAMP: Senator Keyes, that is a good question. I do not have the answer. I will obtain the answer.

SENATOR KEYES: Well, if it don't I am going to pull the bill back and make certain that it is a part of the budget, in the 7% part of the budget of any county that imposes it. I was a little surprised at Senator Bernice Labeledz when she
