nonresident permits. That is the basis of the bill. The Corps of Engineers has indicated that we cannot charge unequal permits in areas which they control, and there are areas right around Lincoln, for example, Branched Oak and Pawnee Lake, which are state parks but yet the land is....it is maintained by the state but yet the land is still the federal government's, and Lewis and Clark Lake. There are various spots across the state where the land is still under the federal government's control even though we maintain it and they have indicated that we cannot charge unequal permits for resident and nonresident, so the bill basically equalizes that. It does not raise the resident permit fee, but lowers the nonresident so it would be \$5.00 per resident and nonresident and \$1.50 for the temporary permit. I would move for the advancement of the bill as amended.
