Mr. President, your committee on Ag and Environment whose Chairman is Senator Schmit to whom we referred LB 876 instructs me to report the same back to the Legislature with the recommendation it be advanced to General File.

Finally, Mr. President, I have a thank you note from the family of Dana X. Bible regarding the Legislative Resolution that was passed earlier this session.

PRESIDENT: The Speaker has requested that we change the order of the agenda merely to insert LR 201 which is a Legislative Resolution by Senator DeCamp, I believe, that we will take that up prior to going on Final Reading this morning. So, Senator DeCamp, are you available? Mr. Clerk, if you will read then LR 201, no objections to the Speaker's change of agenda.

CLERK: Mr. President, LR 201 was introduced by Senator John DeCamp and is found on page 718 of the Legislative Journal. Read.

PRESIDENT: The Chair recognizes Senator DeCamp.

SENATOR DeCAMP: Mr. President and members of the Legislature, we took the resolution up at this time because not all members are here and some of the people were concerned about Final Reading. The resolution is super simple, like so many others. Prominent Nebraska citizens die and we memorialize them on the floor. Mr. Froelich was one of the most prominent citizens in northeast Nebraska and certainly the town of O'Neill, Nebraska. Mr. Froelich was the man that put Mr. Capone, Mr. Al Capone in prison and broke the big crime situation or whatever that Mr. Capone had. He moved his family to O'Neill, Nebraska, hid them away for safety and he became a very successful prominent lawyer and director of railroads and everything else in Chicago. He used to go back and forth every weekend on the railroad from Chicago to O'Neill. In O'Neill, Nebraska, if any of you get there, his house is kind of almost a landmark of the area. It is a square block. When I was a little kid we always used to go up there and drive around the big block and see the huge high fences and dogs and all the other things and whisper to each other that that
