PRESIDENT: All right. We will now, the motion before the House is shall the House go under Call? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Record the vote.

CLERK: 29 ayes, 0 nays to go under Call, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: The House is under Call. The Sergeant at Arms will see that all members return to their desks, all non-legislative personnel leave the floor, all legislators will record your presence. The House is under Call. Senator Simon, you want a roll call vote, did I understand you correctly? Let me know when you want to proceed. We have only two absent. Only two are absent. Senator Murphy, Senator Powers, will you register your presence please? The legislators who should be at their desks are Senator Kelly, Senator Kennedy and Senator Warner.

SENATOR SIMON: We can go ahead and start.

PRESIDENT: All right, we will start then. Proceed with the roll call, Mr. Clerk.
