to the appropriation bill and that runs around five million or so, and so, yes, it is within the seven percent but you couldn't do it fifty times or a hundred times over and, you know, at some point it would not be. Yes, it can be.

SENATOR KEYES: Just for the record so that the people know, those that are listening and those that hear this, that we are going to start spending now and this is \$44,000 and \$7,000 that has not been in the budget before and it will have to come from some place. Thank you.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator Schmit, your light is on. Do you wish to speak to 790A?

SENATOR SCHMIT: Well, Mr. President and members of the Legislature, I would like to have Senator DeCamp explain the need for the A bill on this bill. I am afraid that there are some people out in the counties who are going to be asking me questions and I would like to know a little bit more about it.

SPEAKER MARVEL: Senator DeCamp, do you yield?

SENATOR DeCAMP: Yes. The fiscal analyst told me I needed an A bill. It is additional education as I understand it for county attorneys. Whether it is needed or not, I think we will find out from....I told the county attorneys once their bill moved I wanted some documentation as to cost. They are supposed to be putting that together. As you know, routinely the A bill is introduced after the bill advances. The bill advanced. I was just going to keep the A bill going along with it until we find out exactly why they need the money or where it goes, and this kind of thing. Get you that information a little later.

SENATOR SCHMIT: Senator DeCamp, what is the cost to the counties in this instance as a result of LB 790? What is it going to cost Butler County....Platte County I guess is what I want to ask you?

SENATOR DeCAMP: Well, I don't think it costs them anything, does it?

SENATOR SCHMIT: I believe it will. Aren't the counties going to be stuck for the cost eventually?
