

SENATOR KEYES: Native Americans happens to be the Indian and I don't think there is that many of them, Senator.

SENATOR KOCH: Well, I think I am a native American too.

SENATOR KEYES: I remember when you came over. The University of Nebraska, it's going to take \$2,700,000 to finance this bill. For the tech....state colleges it is going to take \$350,000 and for the tech colleges it is going to take \$65,000. That means that the citizens of this state that are paying the tuition are going to substitute out of their income for those that do not live here, those who are not residents, we are going to substitute \$3,116,000. It means that we are going to stick the taxpayers of this state who are paying the taxes, supporting the University, we are going to pay them....it's going to cost them \$3,000,000. I just want you to know that. We do....there is some justification for it in the fact that we do use federal funds to run all of these universities and colleges, and through that extent I would say that the federal funds should be whether you are a resident of Nebraska or not, should be credited to your tuition, but to come in and say that we are going to give people who are not residents, who are not paying taxes in this state, have not for one full year, the same as my children get, no. I do not believe in taking \$3,000,000 and \$3,000,000 happens to be just \$2.00 out of every man, woman and child's pocket. I don't believe that what Senator Koch is trying to do is right. I wish he would amend it down just to take care of the federal appropriations that come in and let the people of this state realize that they are supporting their children and when you want to be a resident of this state and are paying taxes for your residence, fine, you can pay it.

SENATOR CLARK: Mr. Chairman, I have looked all session for something to agree with Senator Keyes with and I have finally found it. After being here for twelve years, I certainly agree with him on this one. I don't know what obligation we owe to nonresident students to come into our University when they are already having a problem, they want a sixteen percent increase, and then decrease them by \$3,000,000, all of the higher education, and we are stuck with it. Now, I realize it depends on what the boards do, but Omaha has asked for this for I don't know how long. Peru has asked for it when I was on the budget committee. Wayne asked for it and Chadron asked for it. There is no reason to expect
