

filed for that. Moving in here, they would then be given a nonresident tuition as well. And it also allows for a graduate from a state high school in Nebraska who had attended an educational institution in this state after he graduated but left for some reason and came back, that person would be eligible for the resident tuition as well. That is the provision of the bill.

SENATOR NICHOL: Thank you. Now the other question, how does resident tuition compare to nonresident tuition if the bill should pass? Approximately, what would be the percentage of...percentage more that the nonresident would pay as compared to the resident?

SENATOR KOCH: We don't set any tuition fees in this bill at all, Senator Nichol. That remains for the Regents...

SENATOR NICHOL: All right.

SENATOR KOCH: ...and the college boards.

SENATOR NICHOL: All right, this just applies to resident or nonresident.

SENATOR KOCH: All we are trying to do is to amend the statute as we originally had it. They had eight categories of students and we are trying to clarify and to bring it up to date.

SENATOR NICHOL: Okay, thank you.
