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are different, but I think it averages around maybe 18, 19...

SENATOR MURPHY: 18 percent? And at the University?

SENATOR WARNER: At the University it depends on if you separate out their research public service money which is not a part of their educational program, it runs in my mind it is around 20, 21 percent, something like that.

SENATOR MURPHY: So, basically...

SENATOR WARNER: Some state colleges arrive at that figure too. They are not all the same.

SENATOR MURPHY: Basically, the citizens of this state are paying, let's say, 80 percent of the cost of higher education which amounts to roughly 50 percent of our total state expenditures. Right? For the higher education.

SENATOR WARNER: Well, they have...80 percent is not general fund money, because there is other cash funds besides tuition. You have some federal funds...

SENATOR MURPHY: Jerry, don't you say federal funds, say federal taxes.

SENATOR WARNER: Federal taxes, yes, sir, which we all pay. I am...

SENATOR MURPHY: Basically...

SENATOR WARNER: The University's budget, for example, last year was \$115,000,000 general fund money and I think the total budget was 230 million...40 million, so about half of their total budget...

SENATOR MURPHY: Cost, right.

SENATOR WARNER: ...not quite, was general fund money, and of the...

SENATOR MURPHY: Well, I think...I think with minor discrepancies it is safe to say that the citizens of the state are paying 80 percent of the cost of educating a student today in our higher education systems, period. Now we are clawing and scratching and trying to introduce a lot of bills to save the homeowner and at the same time we are proposing to educate at the expense of those same people who are being taxed out of existence to start educating
