CLERK: 18 ayes, 0 nays to go under Call, Mr. President.

PRESIDENT: We have four excused, Senator Newell, and four more excused until they arrive so we have approximately eight that are not here as far as our records shows. The rest of them should be here. Senator Beutler, do you want to show us your presence? Senator Chronister, do you want to push that button? Thank you. Senator Goodrich, is he here? Senator Barrett, I see you. Senator Newell, I guess we could use you. Senator Kahle, would you give us your vote as present. I think we are waiting for Senator Goodrich, Senator Newell. Do you wish to have a roll call vote then?

SENATOR NEWELL: Is Senator Goodrich here?

PRESIDENT: Senator Goodrich is not here yet but he should be in the... Do you want him here before you...?

SENATOR NEWELL: We can take in call in votes too.

PRESIDENT: Yes, we are taking call in votes.

CLERK: Senator Fowler voting aye; Senator Keyes voting aye; Senator Labeledz voting aye.

PRESIDENT: Senator Kahle, for what purpose do you arise?

SENATOR KAHLE: ...well there is people running around soliciting votes I believe.

CLERK: Senator Marsh voting aye.
