SENATOR REUTZEL: November.

SENATOR KAHLE: Well, much as I would like to support it I will have to oppose it because I am afraid that we are building in again the inflation ratio that we talked about the other day into salaries and into the cost of government the same time we are trying to cut down and I know that these officials are having problems getting enough salary to live on over that period of a four year time but I am really not ready to vote for a constitutional amendment and besides that, I think right now it would be voted down about ten to one the way people's minds are made up and the way they feel about taxes, so I would oppose LB 383 on that grounds.

PRESIDENT: Senator Nichol, you may close. Senator Nichol, we are ready for closing. All right, he waives closing so the motion is the motion to advance LB 383 to E & R initial. All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay.

PRESIDENT: Senator Reutzel.

SENATOR REUTZEL: How many are excused? I will try that line first.

PRESIDENT: We have got nine absent.

SENATOR REUTZEL: Nine are excused. That is just about how many votes we need. That means there are twenty-one who aren't voting.

PRESIDENT: Right.

SENATOR REUTZEL: I would sure hate to make the motion that I am about to make.

PRESIDENT: But I guess you had better.

SENATOR REUTZEL: ...eight more votes. I would guess I am going to be forced to have a Call of the House.

PRESIDENT: The motion is, shall the House go under call? All those in favor vote aye, opposed nay. Have you all voted? Record the vote.

CLERK: 21 ayes, 0 nays to go under Call.

PRESIDENT: The House is under Call. The Sergeant at Arms will see that all members return to the Chamber. All members will return to their desks. Unauthorized personnel
